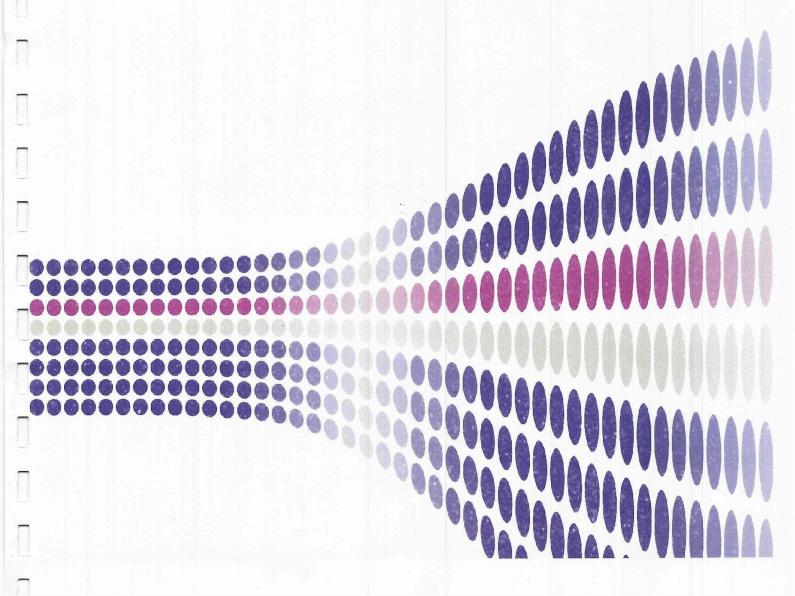

DIRECTORS REPORT

On behalf of the Board of Directors of the company, it gives me immense pleasure to present the Annual Report together with audited financial statements of the Company for the year ended June 30, 2025.

Economic Overview

FY25 marked a period of steady consolidation for Pakistan, underpinned by the continuation of IMF-supported reforms, improved external sector performance, and a gradual recovery in overall economic activity. Following the successful completion of scheduled program reviews, the government secured disbursements of USD 2.0 billion under the Extended Fund Facility (EFF).

Economic momentum strengthened modestly, with real GDP recording growth of 2.68%. Sectorwise, services expanded by 2.91%, industry by 4.77%, while agriculture registered a modest gain of 0.56%. Per capita income rose by 9.75% to USD 1,824, compared to USD 1,662 in FY24. On the external front, the current account registered a surplus of USD 2.1 billion, driven by robust remittance inflows and restrained import demand. Foreign exchange reserves improved to USD 14.5 billion by year-end, supported by external inflows and IMF program assistance. Remittances reached a record-high USD 38.3 billion, reflecting effective policy measures, while technology services exports rose to an all-time high of USD 3.8 billion, highlighting the sector's growing global competitiveness. Inflation eased significantly, averaging 4.49% compared to 23.4% in the previous year, primarily due to stable food prices and currency stability. In response to improved macroeconomic indicators, the State Bank of Pakistan reduced the policy rate from 20.5% at the beginning of the fiscal year to 11% by year-end, thereby laying the foundation for a gradual and sustainable economic recovery.

Market Overview

The KSE-100 Index delivered exceptional performance in FY25, reaching an all-time high of 125,627 points, reflecting a significant turnaround in investor sentiment. This rally was supported by aggressive monetary easing, improved market liquidity, and the unlocking of underlying value across key sectors. The benchmark index closed the year at 125,627 points, posting a remarkable 60% year-on-year increase (+47,182 points).

Key market drivers included a cumulative reduction of 1,050 basis points in the policy rate, a sharp decline in inflation (4.49% compared to 23.4% in the prior year), and substantial progress on IMF-related engagements, which collectively bolstered investor confidence. FY25 also witnessed robust market activity, with trading volumes and values reaching historic levels. Average daily trading volumes rose by 38% to 633.2 million shares, while average daily traded value (USD-based) surged by 83% to USD 101 million — the highest since FY21.

From a sectoral perspective, the index gains were led by Commercial Banks (+15,155 points), Fertilizers (+9,716 points), Exploration & Production (+6,865 points), Cement (+5,622 points) and

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OMC (+2,300 points). Despite this robust performance, the market experienced a net foreign outflow of USD 304 million (compared to an inflow of USD 141 million in FY24), with the bulk of outflows concentrated in Commercial Banks (USD 108.7 million), Fertilizers (USD 66.9 million), Exploration & Production (USD 65.8 million), and FMCGs (USD 42.3 million).

Company's Financial Overview

The Company posted operating revenue of Rs. 202.6mn during the period under review as compared to last year's Rs. 104.06mn. Before and after-tax (loss)/profit stood at Rs. 861.6mn and Rs. 664.4mn respectively, as compared to last year of Rs. 302.2mn and 272.6mn respectively. The equity of the Company as at the balance sheet date is Rs. 1,329.6mn (June 2024: Rs. 665.6mn), which translates into book value per share of Rs. 110.80 (June 30, 2024: Rs. 55.47).

Broking operations have posted a total revenue of Rs. 202.6mn in FY25, which is 94.69% when compared with FY24. Institutional and retail revenues increased by 107.74% and 82.32% respectively. On the other hand, operating and administrative have been increased by 75.19%.

Management Rating

The Company has been reaffirmed a management rating of BMR2 by the VIS Credit Rating Company Limited (VIS). The outlook on the assigned ratings is 'Stable'. The rating signifies strong compliance and risk management and sound external control, HR & infrastructure and financial management.

Entity Rating

The Company has been reaffirmed entity ratings of 'BBB+/A-2' (Triple B Plus/A-Two) by VIS Credit Rating Company Ltd. (VIS). The outlook on the assigned ratings is 'Stable'. This certification defines Adequate credit quality, Protection factors are reasonable and protected, Liquidity factors and company fundamentals are sound provides further confidence to the company's clientele with regards to the credibility and stability of the company.

Future Prospects

Overall direction of Pakistan's economy remains positive buttressed by low international commodity prices and healthy remittances flows. Further, with the country under an IMF Program, fiscal consolidation should continue as the government is required to run a sizable primary surplus, a crucial program condition. In the above backdrop, macroeconomic indicators



including inflation, current account, forex reserves and exchange rate are likely to remain supportive for a gradual acceleration in economic growth.

Notwithstanding robust performance last year, equity market is still quite attractive given low return in alternate asset classes, including fixed income and real estate, expected pickup in GDP growth and growing domestic investor base. This would reflect positively on the pure agency business which is primarily equities broking.

Recommendation

The directors have not recommended any payout due, as the capital would be used for future expansion purposes.

Auditors

The auditors M/s. Grant Thornton Anjum Rahman., Chartered Accountants have retired and being eligible offer themselves for reappointment.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

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We have audited the annexed financial statements of Insight Securities (Private) Limited (the Company), which comprise the statement of financial position as at June 30, 2025, and the statement of profit or loss, the statement of comprehensive income, the statement of changes in equity, the statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including summary of material accounting policies and other explanatory information, and we state that we have obtained all the information and explanations which, to the best of our knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purposes of the audit.

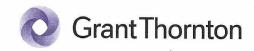
Board of directors are responsible for overseeing the Company's financial reporting process.
